Progress and Growth, Even in Times of Crisis



DEAR ALUMNI AND FRIENDS, in last year's Bulletin, my letter focused on Kiski's tuition reset plan. Launched in October 2019, this new initiative lowered our tuition to be 20% less than the average cost at peer boarding schools. The reset was an unqualified success, producing a dramatic increase in inquiries and applications. As of early January, projections based on historic yield rates indicated that we were on course for a record opening enrollment for the 2020-21 school year.

And then, COVID-19 struck.

We sent the boys home for spring break in early March. Just a few weeks later, we announced that classes would be delivered online starting in April, with students working from home for the rest of the year. Our remote-learning program earned strong reviews, thanks in large part to the impressive adaptability of our students, their families, and the extraordinary efforts of our teachers.

As we began developing our reopening plan for September, we recognized that some of our students wouldn't be able to return right away due to travel

restrictions. We also knew that some parents wouldn't want their sons to be away from home during the pandemic. Aiming to keep all of our students engaged and enrolled until they could all join us on campus, we developed a single integrated program called *ONE Kiski* to allow both in-person and online learning to happen simultaneously and seamlessly. The program was positively received by parents since it offered them maximum flexibility in deciding when and how their son would return to school, ensuring an uninterrupted educational experience in the meantime.

In early September, we opened the new school year with an enrollment of 172 students with 80% on campus and the rest studying remotely. We had six months without boys here and their return brought unique joy and enthusiasm that had been absent for too long. Our comprehensive Health & Safety Plan, which goes above and beyond CDC guidelines, has kept everyone well in an environment that limits outside exposure. The rapid-testing program we developed has allowed for safe athletic competition

this fall. Masks and social-distancing notwithstanding, the school year continues to unfold positively and productively.

As much as daily operations have been running smoothly, COVID-19 has created some real financial challenges for Kiski this year. Summer programs, which are normally a major source of revenue, were canceled. Like all boarding schools and colleges, we've experienced a drop in enrollment and, at the same time, we've seen an increase in tuition aid as a result of financial stress on families. Taken together, these factors have created a significant financial gap, one that we are working to resolve with the help and support of those who have a special place in their heart for our school.

Recognizing that planning for the future is always necessary, even during a pandemic, we distributed our latest Strategic Plan last month, *A Boys' School of High Order*. The title is a tribute to Kiski's founder, Andrew Wilson. In Kiski's first catalog, printed in 1888, Dr. Wilson stated that his goal was to establish "a boys' school of high order that would prepare graduates to enter any American

college or scientific school." In the interceding 132 years, our school has grown and changed in remarkable ways. Our new plan outlines an ambitious vision for Kiski's future. With your backing, we will continue our growth, undeterred by the global health crisis.

A key part of this deliberate growth began in early 2020 with a comprehensive review of campus culture. Like the tuition reset that preceded the economic strain caused by the pandemic, the development of a Diversity Action Plan proved serendipitous. Candid conversations with students, parents, and alumni supplied us with valuable insights well before similar conversations were happening with greater intensity across the nation.

Armed with broader perspectives, we published our Diversity Action Plan in August. The plan contains words that have been politicized to a degree that can obscure their meanings. In our setting, we use "anti-racist" in the same way we do "anti-bullying." That is, it's not enough not to bully others; our expectation is that if you see someone being bullied, you will stand up and speak out. So too with

racism. That ideal is altogether consistent with the principles and values that have always guided Kiski and a noble standard to which we should hold all members of our school community.



HONORS CONVOCATION AND SENIOR AWARDS CEREMONY

Cum Laude Speaker, **Haotian Wu '20**, opened the first of our two virtual ceremonies. He focused on the journey he shared with the Kiski community that led the group to and through the challenges of the final weeks of remote learning. Haotian, sharing his recording from his home in China, spoke fondly of overcoming language barriers during the summer session before the start of his first Kiski year. He acknowledged he has come a long way from accidentally signing up for American football while thinking he was going to join the soccer team.

Ultimately, he credited the full community for helping him to adjust. "Together, we have formed countless discussion groups, finished hundreds of group projects, completed all kinds of Spanish conversations, spent days and hours in the library studying, and also just hanging out, or talking, or playing video games," he said.

Learning Center Director, and parent of both **T.J.** '18 and **Christian** '20, **Mrs. Darcie Spahn** pondered the concept of life being a gigantic jigsaw puzzle that needs to be solved. "Some puzzles—the best ones—take a lifetime to construct," Mrs. Spahn stated. She echoed a sentiment shared by many Kiski faculty members, that "perseverance is something that is instilled in every Kiski student, as they move on their different paths." She advised the boys to continue improving their strategies for solving puzzles they will encounter, and to keep avoiding approaches that include procrastinating.

The CEO for the Fund for Advancement of Minorities through Education (FAME), Mr. Darryl Wiley, offered his own advice to the Class of 2020, while recognizing the senior FAME Scholars – Kiski Boys that received tuition assistance from FAME. His inspirational guidance touched on six themes: listen to your parents, trust your genius, there is no substitute for hard work, love on those closest to you, remember the values and all that you learned at FAME, and find the opportunity in this crisis.

The final speaker was, **Mr. James Perry**, who was departing after 11 years of service to Kiski in multiple roles. The multitalented Mr. Perry may have been best known as the head coach for Kiski's football team. Coach Perry drew from that experience to share football metaphors and pass along his "gems" and "nuggets" to the viewers.

He emphasized the importance of preparation by stating, "If you fail to prepare, to perform at a high level during the week, you will not be able to perform at a high level on game day. This axiom, you will find, applies to every facet of your life."

Similarly, he cautioned against apathy concerning perceptions of your own talent. "Effort takes no talent. You can perform at the highest levels as long as you are willing to put forth the highest level of effort," he bellowed in a tone he used to capture the attention of locker rooms and classrooms full of teenage boys during his Kiski career.

His parting advice highlighted perhaps the biggest advantage of learning in a boarding school environment. "Don't ignore the lessons learned on bus rides, in the schoolyards, at the kitchen table, at formal dinner. All of your learning here at Kiski and beyond will not take place in a classroom," he remarked.

Many Kiski Boys were recognized individually with awards for applying a mixture of their own talents and efforts. They were all dared to contemplate their own experiences, strategies, and circumstances by the enlightening collection of speakers.

KISKI'S 132ND COMMENCEMENT CEREMONY

The Paradise Hall bell rang 20 times to announce the start of a unique commencement ceremony. The rite is usually held in the Yukevich Quadrangle. Occasionally, weather forces the gathering of Kiski Boys, their families, and friends inside. This year, the tradition was moved to a virtual environment.

Kiski families honored their graduates with small in-home viewing parties. Graduation ties, typically distributed to the seniors during a breakfast before graduation, were distributed before the boys left campus. Diplomas and other awards were mailed before graduation.

Head Prefect and Class Speaker, **Patrick Jacob '20**, offered a solution to a challenge caused by the virtual setting. "I am going to pause in my speech whenever I think I said something funny because I'm sure you're going to be laughing," he joked. Patrick was known for sharing a groan-inducing witticism during each of his morning meeting addresses.

Patrick reflected on some of his fondest memories that included the boisterous celebration following the announcement of two Kiski Boys acceptances into their dream schools during a prefect meal at the Head of School's house. "The roars that happened when **Tony Wang ['19]** got into U-Penn could be heard at summer camp hill. They were even louder when **Brayant Garcia ['19]** got into Harvard," Patrick reflected.

The President of Kiski's Board of Trustees, **Mr. John Jacob '89**, spoke of how the current class will join other unique classes from Kiski's history. Before introducing the parent speaker, he said, "although this will be a talking point for you for the remainder of your lives, I would suggest, like those before and those that will come after you, that your unique pandemic period of time will not define you, and will be simply a profound talking point."

Mrs. Monica Tillman, mother of Micah '20, echoed those thoughts sharing, "this class will truly go down in history as young men who triumphed in spite of adversity they faced." She framed the moment by complimenting the ability of the School and its students to move from a brick and mortar structure to a virtual learning environment.

She also shared recollections of conversations with her son from each year that he attended Kiski. The comment she recalled from Micah's sophomore year was

especially amusing, "Mom, your hormones and my hormones are clashing. I like [Assistant Athletic Director and Ethics and Personal Development Department instructor] **Mrs. Muster** because she's teaching me to deal with you."

Her memory of a conversation during the spring of 2020 carried a deeper message. "Mom, you can stop worrying about me. You and Dad raised me right. I'm not a little kid anymore. I'm glad I went to Kiski. Kiski was the place for me. I'm ready to go away to college. I'm prepared. I want the chance to live life and make my own choices," Mrs. Tillman recalled.

Typically, graduates are called to the stage to receive their diplomas following the Parent Speaker's remarks. This year, a slideshow of photos was played for each boy after his name was read by **Associate Head of School Mark Novom**.

Once the last name was read, Valedictorian **J.P. Suozzi '20** shared his reflections on the current situation. "No matter how much we wished things were different, the outcome isn't going to change. In a world where everything seems out of our control, we have to latch on to what we can control, our outlook," he said. He closed with a challenge. "My fellow classmates, I ask you not to let our last meeting be that day before spring break. Don't let this Kiski brotherhood sink to the back of our minds until it is just a memory. Let's make an effort to see each other again," J.P. stated.

Head of School Chris Brueningsen closed the program by offering his praise of the Kiski Boys. "Under tough circumstances, you transitioned to learning online, and we all made the best of an imperfect hand that was dealt to us," he reflected.


He concluded with a message of hope for the Class of 2020 and Generation-Z as a whole. "Even beyond COVID-19, the challenges facing your generation are big and urgent. Securing peace in a time

of global conflict, bringing stability to a troubled world economy, finding cures for cancer and developing projects that will save the planet. You should probably get to work on all of that. Not right now, but sometime soon. More than any time in recent history, we need a heroic generation to lead us. A real measure of a generation's strength is how they come together to master the challenges of their time," he said.

We can look forward to the Class of 2020's many returns, and updates concerning how they are confronting the trials of this era. In the short term, the virtual ceremony offered an opportunity to call the class together from all corners of the world and remind them that although their most recent departure from campus was abrupt and jarring, Kiski will forever be their home. Their returns will always be welcomed and celebrated occasions. They will always be Kiski Boys.

"Our season had some ups and downs, but overall it was a good productive season," summarized **Head Coach Greg Forsythe**. "Throughout the season, I saw improvement." The Cougars placed the highest of their campaign during the closing meet, ranking fifth out of thirteen teams in the single-A division.

"We were coming together, combining our seasoned leadership with the new-bloods. It's my belief that with the new-bloods coming back next year to lead the team further, the team will be able to reach even higher heights," shared Forsythe.

The coach praised the team's senior captains: Ryan Pettes, Corben Kohut and Gaheris Kohut for surpassing his expectations of them as leaders and motivators. The three shared Coaches' Award honors. Corben Kohut deflected the attention to his teammates saying, "my favorite part of this team was the van rides to the meets, because we would all just get ready for the race and bust each other up. // GOLF

Varsity Golf maintained its dual match winning streak that started back in 2017, finishing 9-0 in that format. The Cougars added four tournament wins, including the Interstate Prep School League Championship for the first time since 2013. They won the Westmoreland County Coaches Association Small School Tournament trophy for the seventh straight year, the Wheeling Cup Invitational at Sunnehanna for the second straight year and the Sinking Valley Invitational Tournament.

"From the very start, everyone was playing better than last year, and I had really high hopes," **Head Coach Mark Orsatti** recalled. He also pointed to the unparalleled preseason training the team enjoyed as a catapult to their success. **Jim Saitta '83** invited the boys to play at South Hills Country Club. **Russ Swank '67** treated the team to a special day at Oakmont Country Club. The boys were also invited to play at the Pikewood National Golf Club and Bedford Springs.

With a solid foundation in place, Kiski's superior depth led to an exceptional season. Fewer than eight strokes separated the average score for the number one and number ten players. "Each of our top five guys claimed the medalist honors at least once," Orsatti boasted.

One of those top players, **Patrick Jacob '20**, challenged the returners to keep their winning streaks alive and, "continue to play some Billy Joel in the vans after some nice wins."

Varsity Football completed another fantastic season with a 6-2 record. During the fall sports awards ceremony, **Head Coach Jim Perry** specifically acknowledged his "four-year-freaks" that compiled a record of 26-7 during their Kiski careers. He listed off the names of recent graduates that left their marks on the current seniors, acknowledging an unbroken chain of leadership. He challenged the returning boys to continue their tradition of success on and off the field.

Coach Perry also credited Line Coach Frank Cignetti Sr. for limiting opponents to two sacks that weren't attributable to bad snaps. Referencing quarterback Ryne Wallace's '20 comfort in the pocket, Coach Perry remarked, "now he's back there ordering pizza, because he's got time."

Cougar grit was another defining feature highlighted by Coach Perry. He praised boys who played with nagging



injuries like **Jahmeir Adderley '20**, who played running back with broken fingers, blocking, carrying without fumbling, and scoring a pivotal touchdown.

// SOCCER

Before the Varsity Soccer team began the state playoffs as the 4-seed, **Head Coach Jonty Loukes** shared his prediction at the fall sports awards ceremony saying, "from the moment I saw the team come together on the bus trip back from Wilmington (preseason), I knew this team has the crucial team bond that it takes to win the state championship." His team met that expectation by capturing the program's first-ever Pennsylvania Independent Schools Athletic Association Championship.

An injury-riddled 12-6-2 regular season sidelined key players, including their adept leader and Coaches Award winner **Luca Venditti '20**. **Max Mears '20** earned the Most Improved Player Award for his part in filling injury voids.

The Cougars pressed on, never losing a game in which they led, and coming from behind to win or tie five times.

Key lessons were learned along the way. "The loss against South Kent showed us that no matter how good we thought we were, we were not good enough to

take plays off," said Loukes.

The regular season finale loss to South Kent also led to a pivotal change to Loukes' approach for the remainder of the season. After seeing that Kiski's best defense was a relentless attack, "from that point on we pressed teams high and attacked with numbers," Loukes recounted. Kiski shut out every playoff opponent but the top-seeded Hill School on the way to capturing the title.

After defeating Hill on penalty kicks in the semifinals, the third-seeded Haverford School essentially hosted Kiski

on the eastern side of the state for the final. However, an anonymous alumnus paid for busses to shuttle the Kiski Boys to Immaculata University, and they cheered themselves hoarse.

A tense game was live streamed to alumni, parents, and friends watching from all over the world. When Ben
Feinstein '23 tallied the first score of the game, the pressure was momentarily lifted for a jubilant celebration. After Simón
Fernandez '20 added a second goal in the waning minutes of the game, it seemed the outcome was sealed as goalie Gabriel
Matos '21 and the nearly impenetrable
Cougar defense preserved another shutout.

The injury-depleted underdogs triumphed, just as their coach predicted, in a hostile and distant road environment. Players and the brothers that traveled across the state to support them hugged and lifted each other off the turf.

"Throughout the season, every player played a role in the state championship, and every contribution was just as important, no matter how big or small it was," summarized Loukes.

"Although we had big fallbacks, this only makes our season even more of a success as we adapted," said Most Valuable Player Award winner, **Mark**Shoebridge '20. "To the rising seniors, it's up to you to step up and carry this team all the way. You have to lead by example and set the bar high for the newcomers," he concluded.

// SWIMMING

At a small boarding school, it is important that every boy participates in athletics, which leads to opportunities to try new sports. Playing time is abundant, even when experience is not. Of the 13 swimming letter winners, only four swam for Kiski before, and only about half had any history of swimming competitively. The swimmers took advantage of their opportunities. "You saw several athletes, not just one or two, but several athletes cut tens of seconds off their 100 [yard race distances]. We have several athletes who cut several minutes off of their events. This growth came from bravery. It is really easy to go and perform and do something you've done, but a lot of the boys this year had never done anything like this before," said **Head Coach Josh Sunday**.

Coach Sunday recognized two swimmers that embodied this theme. He presented the Rookie of the Year Award to **Anthony Wang '22** who became the team's top backstroker by the end of the year. **Timothy Allsbouse '22** earned the Most Improved Player Award because of his commitment to bettering himself by seeking critiques after each of his races.

"Starting swimming is possibly the easiest task ever, you just need to get in the water and float. However, for the competitive aspect of swimming, it is a deeply personal involvement of self-improvement and continuous effort," summarized **Captain Alex Stewart '20**.

The Varsity Basketball team's tenacity was tested early and often. The boys had to overcome late losses twice in tournaments, and rise early the next morning to defeat their next opponents. First, they lost to The Hill School in overtime of Hill's tournament but toppled The Peddie School in the consolation final. In the Midwest Classic, they battled back to take the lead after trailing by 23 points early against Don Bosco Prep. They eventually dropped that contest but drubbed a strong St. Michael's College School by 53 points the next morning.

Head Coach Damien Williams attributed their cohesive play to their boarding school environment. "The biggest advantage that our boys have is the camaraderie and togetherness they have before the season even starts," Williams concluded. "Most of the boys spend the entire fall in the weight room and on the court becoming stronger together and building a very tight bond."

Kiski battled onward earning an opportunity to host its first playoff game in six years by beating The Phelps School in the final game of the regular season. Hoag Gymnasium was alive with excitement as Kiski triumphed over Shipley in the first round. The Cougars fell in the next round, completing the season with a 13-11 record.

Although its talented seniors are moving on, including Coaches' Award honorees **Stephen Watson** and **Xavier Lyons**, Kiski has a bright future. Eight varsity players will return, including Most Valuable Player, **Christopher**

// WRESTLING

Head Coach Joe Ross possesses a remarkable ability to lead young teams, guiding boys with little or no wrestling experience to greatness. Chris Rubino '20 makes a fine example of this talent. After wrestling for Coach Ross for only two years, the Most Improved Player Award-winner qualified for Nationals in the 285-pound weight class.

Rubino was joined at the prestigious national tournament by two promising freshmen: winner of the Most Valuable Player Award **Sulayman Bah** in the 113-pound weight class, and **Corbin Johnston** on the 182-pound level. "As a freshman [Johnston] went 2-2 [at the national tournament]. I believe that's outstanding," remarked Ross.

The boys made up for their lack in depth with exceptional resiliency that Coach Ross honed with demanding training sessions. The boys were responsible for pushing each other through grueling practice bouts that prepared them for competition on the highest levels.

The golf and cross country teams employed social distancing measures to enable competition. Golfers stayed in foursomes consisting of their teammates and used the honors system for scoring, rather than mixing foursomes with other schools. Meanwhile, cross country competed in heats by school to limit interaction between programs.

Our contact sports used a "bubble" system with protocols similar to the ones professional sports used. Kiski limited soccer and football opponents to boarding schools employing the same strict testing measures.

DESPITE THE ISOLATION OF KISKI, high on a bluff overlooking its namesake river, the School is anything but removed from the world around it. Students today are being prepared for a world that is more interconnected globally and technologically than ever before, which will challenge them throughout their lives and careers.

That is why Carlos Rosales and I were so proud to join together to sponsor a competition among Kiski seniors to address, by essay, the subject of ethical artificial intelligence. There are few subjects more daunting or compelling. Six students were finalists with four essays chosen by Kiski faculty to submit to an international panel of AI experts. The two winners were

Grant Lumley and J.P. Suozzi. The prize was to attend a global conference on AI in Singapore, all expenses paid.

As an alumnus and a Kiski board member for almost 40 years, I could not have been prouder of those two boys. Accompanied by Kiski faculty member, Josh Sunday, they represented the very best of our School, introduced and praised before the international audience of AI scholars and practitioners. In addition, they had the chance to explore modern Singapore. Not only was it terrific to expose those boys to a new world, but it was a delight to expose that elite audience to the wonders of Kiski.



Kiski's Response to COVID-19 and How We Move Forward as




KISKI

This spring, the world was turned upside down as the global health crisis spread and disrupted many interactions we may have taken for granted, including in-person education. As we approached spring break, we optimistically planned for a return. Luckily, our break provided a buffer and some time to think about our next moves.

As things escalated, it became evident that a return to campus for the fourth quarter of the 2019–2020 school year was not possible. Our administration and faculty leapt into action to implement an impactful online program that would allow us to strongly finish the year. Utilizing video-conferencing software, our faculty were able to pick up where they left off before the break. We learned valuable lessons and rose to meet the challenges that came at a daily pace, which would begin to inform our plans for the future.

In the spring, we began planning for the new school year, considering our options for offering in-person classes while at the same time accommodating students who would need to learn remotely to start the year. The plan we announced in late May remained unchanged through the start of the new year in September. "ONE Kiski" would become our mantra and the plan would carry the same name.

Our ONE Kiski initiative allowed the choice of whether or not to return to campus to be solely in the hands of our families. The boys that were willing and able returned to campus for in-person classes and the full Kiski experience. Boys who faced travel restrictions or other limitations stayed home to start the school year with a robust virtual platform available until they could return to campus. Unlike other online programs, Kiski's unique approach allowed both groups of boys to take the same class at the same time. Each classroom was outfitted with a webcam,

extra monitors, microphones, and other tech in order for each faculty member to use Zoom (a video-conferencing platform) to stream their classes to the boys at home and those physically attending in the classroom simultaneously.

Of course, the return to the classroom presented several challenges beyond connecting the boys virtually. However, our unique school structure delivered many advantages that helped to make a return possible. Our boarding school environment provided us the opportunity to keep the students on campus, which combined with our rural location, meant that we could gate our community and reduce outside influence. Our class sizes were already small and that meant our existing spaces were already large enough to accommodate social distancing best practices. To help further mitigate any risk, we became a certified testing lab that allowed us to screen students and faculty for COVID-19, returning results within 15 minutes. These testing abilities came

at a significant cost, but afforded the ability to return safely to the classroom and athletic competition. Likeminded approaches by peer boarding schools allowed us to mirror a "bubble" concept adopted by professional sports leagues. With each of the competing schools following a strict testing policy in an isolated boarding school environment, athletic competition can occur at reduced risk to student-athletes and staff.

Though our situation evolves on a daily basis, our community continues to shine through innovation and the application of time-tested Kiski grit. Thank you for your unwavering commitment to our mission during this time. We extend specific thanks to our families, both old and new, for trusting us with the education of their sons and working closely with us to advance Kiski through this health crisis. Together, we remain and move forward as ONE Kiski.



These conversations were enlightening, but also illuminated for us that there was still work to be done. This work was to continue throughout the late winter and spring of 2020, but once the pandemic hit these plans were obviously postponed.


During the summer, our faculty and staff were involved in a number of virtual seminars with **Mr. Malcolm Thomas**, the Program Director for Reaching Black Male Mentoring and Manhood Development in Pittsburgh. The objective of these seminars, which will continue throughout the school year, is to identify our unconscious bias we may have and to introduce a

stage model for substantiating the caring relationship between teachers and students. These seminars have offered invaluable lessons to our faculty and staff and will undoubtedly have long lasting and positive effects on the Kiski community.

The Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Action Plan memorializes Kiski's commitment to being a campus community dedicated to anti-racism. It's an important step that sets forth tangible initiatives and measurable goals meant to support a broad vision for diversity and inclusion at Kiski. We are proud of the work of the Diversity Committee and the Board of Trustees has done in helping to develop this Action Plan.

We have already started the process of meeting with students both in-person and virtually to ensure that we are listening and understanding their needs. As the school year moves forward, our students will have further opportunities to engage, discuss, and learn about each other's cultures, backgrounds, and traditions through programs such as The Culture Pot, and Father's Circle, and through everyday interactions and conversations.

Wavelength Platform Provides Kiski Alums with Advanced Networking Resources

in our alumni community to bring our vast network of global Kiski graduates closer together and further increase the value of a Kiski education. Shortly after receiving this publication, Kiski alumni will receive an email invitation from the Kiski-branded Wavelength platform. From there, alums can explore the Map-Based Search Directory to explore the globe to find classmates, alumni in a specific location, or others that share the same career field.

Users can then either email alumni directly or invite them to Zoom video calls. The platform's Zoom integration allows alumni to invite individuals or small groups to reconnect online. Users can link to a personal Zoom account

or reach out to Wavelength which can assist in creating a Zoom account. We are mindful of everyone's data privacy, and at any time each user can change their privacy and contact settings from their profile directly.

The jobs board feature allows users to post job opportunities within the network to the trusted Kiski community or find opportunities for themselves. You can also submit class notes so we can share your updates. We ask that alumni keep their own info up-to-date, whether that is contact info or what teams or clubs they participated in while at Kiski. Ideally, we will be able to add group specific features, for example, custom email lists for wrestling alumni to share team specific updates. As more alumni become active

on the platform, we can look forward to adding and expanding its capabilities and impact on the Kiski Alumni Network.

Class Captains have been test-driving the new platform and finding it very helpful. "Wavelength is super useful. It does not seem difficult to use or update, which is always a risk when asking people to create an account on yet another network. The ability to create maps of nearby alumni is incredibly interesting, and the data health tools make it easier to keep contact info updated," said Class Captain John Zang '09.

Our hope is that this will be used to rekindle connections, share memories, and advance careers. •



A Typical Day in the John A. Pidgeon Library

Being open nearly 70 hours per week, each day looks a bit different from the next. However, students most frequently visit to:

- Locate resources for assignments using the online catalog and subscription research databases.
- Learn skills in proper citation and ethical use of information.
- Enjoy a quiet atmosphere for study and homework.
- Utilize an array of printers, copiers, scanners and laminators for projects and papers.
- Get proofreading help on essays and written work.
- Meet with fellow students or teachers for group assignments, extra help and tutoring, or extracurricular club meetings.

Here's how those activities might look in action on a given day at the Pidgeon Library:

6:30 am: Housekeepers open the doors, and procrastinating boys file in to finish major assignments.

8:00 am: Librarians arrive, usually to find boys already here, sitting quietly, working, or double checking the school app for assignments and due dates.

8:15 am: The copy machine and the coffee maker are both fired up. The sound of the printer whirs into action as boys filter in to pick up homework papers from the printer and rush out to get to class on time.

8:30 am: During first period, **Mrs. Leslie Poston** is covering two classes visiting the library. The seniors in **Dr. John**

Williams chemistry class are seated near the white board to view the demo of the science databases. They are working in pairs to prepare short presentations on different types of energy and power plants. On the other side the room, over near the Reference section, the sophomore Men in Society students are discovering career paths using self-assessments and government web sites.

Meanwhile, Assistant Librarian, **Mrs. Meredith Galo** is helping a few juniors in the copier room with their history project. They are creating trading cards on American Revolutionary figures. They've gathered information and images using subscription databases, and designed and formatted the cards using Adobe Illustrator. They will then print, cut and laminate the final products, using library tools and supplies.

9:25 am: Students are in study hall, some sitting with the librarian at the help desk practicing vocabulary words for their test next period.

10:15 am: The Kuerig machine is on, as well as Mrs. Galo's Nespresso—a new favorite! A couple of students bring snacks to the work room and stop by the jigsaw puzzle table.

10:30 am: Mr. Vince Kwiatek's US History students come each lab period to work on the junior research paper. This year's topic is "The United States as the Land of Opportunity". Students locate primary documents in print sources and relevant content in databases related to their specific topic, then create an argument based on the evidence they uncover. They collect and format bibliographic information and note cards using an online research platform.

After lunch, students sign in for study halls. Upon checking the new Honor Roll list, posted in the library, some will exercise their privileges to spend their study hall in the student center. Some stay in the library to meet with **Mrs. Carla Ross** about an upcoming Culture Pot activity, assembly, or International Food Festival t-shirt designs.

Students sign in for class when teachers are absent due to sports or illness. Mrs. Poston likes to take these opportunities to teach important information literacy skills, like how to be good digital citizens and evaluate information for accuracy and reliability.

2:35 pm: "Flex during Flex" is a drop-in yoga practice Mrs. Poston started in the library and because of popular demand has moved to the gym for Intersession Yoga.

3:00 pm: The end of a regular school day is that start of the evening hours at the Pidgeon Library and the Librarian on Duty arrives. The Librarian-on-Duty becomes Administrator-on-Duty during the afternoon hours as well, taking calls from students who need assistance or permission to leave campus.

While students are at sports, the library staff works on collection development and upcoming programs—all-school book discussion guides, book tastings, readers advisories, Black History month and Chinese New Year displays. Mrs. Galo plans Sunday story hours and Mrs. Ross plans for Culture Pot roundtable discussions and guest speakers that often take place in the Bradley Reading Room.

Before and after dinner is the time of day typically when the library is visited by faculty families out taking their kids

and dogs for a walk. Kiski students are often dog walkers in the afternoons while Sunday story hours provide Kiski Boys the community service opportunity to read to faculty children and help with crafts and activities.

7:00 pm: Augmented Study Hall students (boys assigned for more acute mandatory academic assistance) report to the library for their structured study time.

7:30 pm-9:30 pm: Evening study hall. On average, 25 students opt to sign out of their dorms during evening study hall to do their work in the library, where it's generally quiet and free of distractions.

Days and nights in the library are filled with more than just reading and research.

Poster printing, photocopying, extra help, peer tutoring, Learning Center hours, along with friendly games of chess and puzzle breaks are all going on during the evening until 10 pm, when the last boys gather up their backpacks and head back to the dorms. •



Mrs. Szilagyi was a beloved member of the Kiski community for 50 years. Knowing what his mother meant to his Kiski brothers, her son, **Steven T. Szilagyi '88**, deferred the honor of writing her luminary passage to the Kiski Boys from the past half century. Editing these heartfelt expressions down was an impossible task. Thank you to all that submitted your reflections, even if they could not be contained here. Here are a handful of their messages to Steve and his father, **Tamas**:

GREG ZEIGLER '64 Brigitta was all warmth, smiles and loveliness. I had many aunts growing up at Kiski but she was one of the sweetest. I don't remember a harsh word—ever. And for a little kid from Saltsburg, I was getting to know and admire a couple from another country. Brigitta took the "foreign" out of "foreigner" and replaced it with it comfortable, familiar. I learned a lot from her. A wonderful woman.

CARL KALNOW'68 Your mother was a beautiful lady who was always kind in the dorm (Clark), at the dinner table, and in the



library where she was most helpful. Kiski would not be the same without her loyalty! I was privileged to know her!!

ED MARKS '68 I spent two years at Kiski. I was a long way from home and pretty homesick and your parents, especially your mom, helped me deal with that in my first couple of months.

WOODY DANFORTH '72 I have tears of joy and sorrow when I think of our Brigitta. We were all fortunate to have been so included as a part of her world and the Kiski world as it existed within her. I was fortunate to have been in MacColl Hall when Steven was born. Brigitta would tactfully approach the "pingpong" room and politely suggest that Tamas get his *&\$ in the apartment and go to bed! I have always honored the dynamics of their relationship and always will, as a parent and spouse. "Faith, Humility and Tolerance". Thank you, Brigitta... Thank you, Tamas... and Thank you, Joe Millar. Kiski was a better place with the unconditional commitment of our Brigitta.

of our bulletin boards, and created seasonal displays, flyers and posters. For these many projects, she had loads of supplies all stashed in various drawers, cabinets, bins, boxes and closets. Like many artistic people do, she saved everything. Bits of fabric, ribbon and crepe paper, pages from magazines, colored and printed papers of all shapes and sizes. And anything she created, she saved to use again. At Halloween she bundled cornstalks, and brought in mums. In the spring she brought blooming forsythia in a vase. And at Christmas, she went crazy with garlands, securely attaching them to every surface, sill and doorway with library-grade binding tape. And for awards at the end of the year, she used her prodigious talent for calligraphy and elaborate ribbon-making!

She never slowed down! Never stopped doing things for other people. Even when she needed a walker to get around, it didn't stop her. And the Kiski boys helped her, walked her to her car at night, carried her bags for her. She just inspired kindness!

THE FOLLOWING IS AN EXCERPT FROM HEAD OF SCHOOL CHRIS BRUENINGSEN'S EULOGY: I first met

Tamas and Bridget when I arrived at Kiski as a rookie teacher in 1990. As they did with so many new teachers, they welcomed me into their home as part of their family.

She knew all the boys who visited the library. She cheered them on and congratulated them on their accomplishments. And she was always there to comfort them during setbacks and offer good advice. Bridget was a mom-away-from-home for generations of boys and they're all better people for knowing her.

Her connection to the boys was always on display for the International Food Festival. Bridget, of course, managed the German table. In later years, Megan and I hosted the cooking at our home, which was an easy assignment since as soon as Bridget arrived she took complete charge of everything. She'd have a group of boys frying schnitzel on one side of the stove while she was giving spätzle-making lessons on the other.

The woman was, in fact, a spätzlemachine. She'd put eggs and flour and the other ingredients into a big bowl, without measuring anything, and mix it all together to create a perfect batter. The batter goes onto a board and, a small bit at a time, gets dragged with a knife into a pot of boiling water. There's a real art to it and for Bridget, it was not a spectator sport. She'd have the boys come over one at a time. They'd hold the knife and she'd hold their hand to demonstrate the correct drag-and-drop technique until they got the hang of it. It makes me smile when I think about all the grown men who've shocked their spouses by saying, "Yeah, I know how to make spätzle!" All thanks to Bridget.

Some people go through life having never encountered a person as lovely as Bridget Szilagyi. We were all lucky and blessed to call her a friend. God bless her for the indelible mark she made on our world.

Professional Development

In the last seven months, the Kiski faculty has navigated the challenges of teaching through Covid-19 safety protocols with aplomb. When the decision was made at spring break to finish the year online, the faculty underwent intense training in-house guided by Mr. Brendan Moriarty '86, Mr. Marcus Muster, Dr. Craig Olear, and Mr. Brad Kwiatek. This training focused on the new technology involved as well as the best practices for online learning. This multi-day training ensured that the faculty was ready to export the best of their teaching to the virtual space, but it also focused on our students and how to make them comfortable in the classroom. These discussions became reality as the training began for the ONE Kiski program. Faculty participated in an intensive online course for teachers with online students and then trained together again for in-house professional development specific to our goals. This successful preparation has led to a strong start to our academic year.

Adaptations to our program were not the only events. Mr. Gino Colella continues his stellar performance toward his Master's Degree at Slippery Rock University. Mr. Gregory M. Forsythe is pursuing his doctoral degree at the Indiana University of Pennsylvania.

During the first week of December, Mrs. Carla Ross and Mrs. Leslie Poston attended the National Association of Independent Schools People of Color Conference in Seattle, WA. This year's conference theme, 1619. 2019. Before. Beyond. Amplifying our Intelligence to Liberate, Co-create and Thrive, commemorated the 400 years since the first British ship carrying captured Angolans arrived in North America, initiating enslavement of Black African people. The conference provided a full schedule of presentations and workshops to help educators build more diversity, equity and inclusion at schools like Kiski.





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12TH ANNUAL WILL'S GIFT

The "Warped Weaver" LaVerne Kemp

E. William Turley '64, one of the finest educators in Kiski's history. Although he was not an artist himself in any traditional sense of the word, his 35 years on the campus could be called nothing but a masterpiece. His devotion to his students knew no bounds and he inspired many of them to be, if not artists, then whole and true versions of themselves. His gift was his passion for inquiry, for truth, and for the guts to accept the price of such a pursuit—attributes without which no fine artist can succeed. His gift was this kind of bravery and he gave of it every day.

On behalf of The Kiski School, Will's Gift is given annually to an artist working in Western Pennsylvania. The goal is to assist with the continued health of Pittsburgh's creative community and to increase and develop Kiski's strong collection in the visual arts. The hope is that the campus itself will become an archive and teaching center, a living and virtual gallery of the region's finest work. "If enough small fires can light an entire community, let Will's Gift be the fuel for one of them," said David Conrad '85, co underwriter of Will's Gift along with Kristofer Rockwell '90.

LaVerne Kemp was named as the 12th annual *Will's Gift Award* recipient by David Conrad during the 2020 Virtual Honors Convocation Ceremony. Ms. Kemp is known as "The Warped Weaver" for her intricate and creative

designs using many different processes including the use of handmade manual looms, batik, stumping, dyeing, and beading. The Wilkinsburg, Pa. resident has been working in the community for over 30 years. Mr. Conrad highlighted her broad spectrum of students. Ms. Kemp has made weaving accessible to little children, library classes, grown men, and immigrant mothers who couldn't speak a word of English but were able to communicate through their work. She has taught at the Pittsburgh Center for the Arts and at the Winchester Thurston School.

Ms. Kemp is a member of the Pennsylvania Council for the Arts and was recently appointed the President of Women of Visions, an African American women's art collective. Her works can be found at the Pittsburgh Center for the Arts, Patricia Boutique, and The Artsmiths of Pittsburgh. •





Capital Campaign Support

FOR THE BOYS

While Kiski's main fundraising priority is The Kiski Fund, capital campaigns allow the School to catapult forward in specific areas of strategic need. Like paying the monthly electric bill for your house, maintaining consistent support of our annual fund is critical for annual operations of the School. To expand on this current metaphor, capital campaign fundraising is similar to pulling together the funding needed for a large house expense like replacing an aging roof. It's necessary to make that pressing purchase; however, those funds can't be borrowed from those set aside for ongoing expenses, like the electric bill.

Our most recent capital campaign for Kiski was known as Leadership for the 21st Century. It was a highly successful campaign for Kiski and it was concluded in June of 2018. The initial campaign goal was to raise \$9 million for physical plant projects and scholarship support. The campaign did exceedingly well and as such grew forward in a few separate phases. The campaign finally closed in successful fashion with \$35 million raised in support of many campus improvement projects, brick-and-mortar projects, support for athletics and new technology as well as much needed endowment scholarship funding. This was the most successful capital campaign ever implemented by Kiski.

Your generous leadership and financial support dedicated to our Leadership for the 21st Century capital campaign allowed us to embark on our recent tuition reset program. This fall, we broke free from a boarding school trend that has seen average tuition increase by 50% over the last decade,

while household incomes have barely budged. The price of Kiski's boarding school tuition is now 20% lower than the average price to attend other boarding schools. Thanks to you, Kiski's boarding tuition dropped from \$61,300 to \$48,500 to start the 2020-21 academic year.

The growth of the School's endowment is our new capital campaign focus. This campaign will become known as our For the Boys campaign. By increasing the School's endowment, we will be able to maintain the long-term stability of the School and make even more financial aid available for deserving Kiski Boys. Kiski has always valued the socioeconomic diversity of our student body. We are grateful for your ongoing support of that core belief and our new campaign to grow the endowment for Kiski.
