Thanks to You, a Return to Normal

I'M VERY PLEASED TO REPORT

that the opening of Kiski's 134th school year has been an unbroken success, especially so when compared to the many challenges we faced during the 2020-2021 school year.

Last fall, with parents concerned about having their sons away from home during the pandemic, we opened school with a record-low enrollment of 172 students. This year, we opened with 190 students—our highest enrollment since 2016 and a 10% increase over last year. We also welcomed the largest group of new students since 2010.

With a community vaccination rate of 90% on campus, we've been able to safely return to "almost normal" operations this year. We still have work to do to fully recover from the financial impact of the pandemic, but our rebound has been significantly accelerated thanks to the remarkable help and support our Kiski friends have supplied over the past 20 months. On behalf of everyone here, thank you! I look forward to providing you with future updates as the school year unfolds.

As we emerge from the global health crisis and reflect on the tragic loss and ongoing challenges of these times, there are some positive outcomes worth noting, like the way we supported each other and reached out to others in need. I know that many of you participated in relief initiatives to help those who were struggling, and your involvement has had an important impact. If there's one thing we've learned during the pandemic, it's that in a crisis, we need to be flexible and adaptable. At last year's graduation program, I shared a story about adaption and survival that in some ways resembles the allegory of the Class of 2021.

The story happened 50 years ago at a boys' boarding school on the island of Tonga in the South Pacific. Six boys ran away from the school and stole a boat with plans to sail to Fiji, some 500 miles away. Although the young men were brought up on the sea and had sailing experience, they set out on this adventure without a map or a compass. What could possibly go wrong?

On the first night, a tropical storm ripped the sails from the mast and tore off the boat's rudder. For over a week their crippled boat drifted aimlessly with no food, or water. After eight days they saw a tiny island. As the boat neared, a wave sent it crashing into the rocky shoreline, smashing it to pieces. The boys struggled

ashore, completely exhausted but very happy to be on land.

Now you might think that what followed would be a real-life version of *Lord of the Flies*, a fictional book that many of you have read about a group of boys who shipwrecked on a deserted island where they divided themselves into tribes, and their lives descended into violence, chaos, and murder.

On the contrary, the boys from Tonga, faced with incredible challenges, pulled together and thrived. They kept themselves healthy and fit and survived on birds and fish and bananas that had been cultivated on the island when it was inhabited by natives 100 years earlier. They captured rainwater using hollowed out logs and eventually figured out how to make fire. They constructed a hut out of palm branches, created a garden, and set up a roster to keep a lookout for passing ships. They even built a badminton court and a makeshift gym.

Fifteen months after they arrived, a lobster fisherman spotted smoke coming from the island. As he got closer, the boys jumped into the water and swam to his boat. There's much more to the story, including the reunion of the boys with their families, all of whom had held funerals

for their sons. It's a story of cooperation and hope and, eventually, salvation.

When I heard this story, my reaction was, that put in a similar situation, this is how our Kiski Boys would react; they'd rely on the strong bonds they'd formed to cooperate and prosper. Then I proudly realized that during the pandemic they'd done just that.

True, the challenges our boys faced weren't as acutely existential as what the Tongan boys experienced. But they navigated through a very tough year, and they did so admirably. Through it all, they applied the lessons they learned and the habits of self-reliance they practiced on this campus and, most of all, they leaned on each other and the friendships they formed. Even though there were periods of loneliness and isolation, in the end, the pandemic brought them all closer, and the resulting message is an important and familiar one: in times of trouble, you can always turn to your Kiski Family for help and support.

If you're a Kiski alumnus, I'm sure you can relate to these sentiments and the enduring connections with your classmates that have been strengthened by shared experiences and many years of friendship. If you're a past or present Kiski parent, you've likely witnessed this brotherhood through the eyes of your son.

In the end, a school is only as strong as the people that make up its greater community and the bonds that exist between them. By that measure and more, Kiski's future is very bright indeed.

HONORS CONVOCATION

With a week remaining in the academic year, the first of Kiski's traditional yearend events was held virtually to maintain a "bubble" environment to protect against COVID-related interruptions leading into final exams. The boys that were on campus gathered with their advisory groups at various locations to continue with our safety policy of limiting large indoor groups. They were joined by remote learners and parents that logged-in from around the world to celebrate Kiski Scholars.

Weilin Zhang '21 started the ceremony with a speech that focused on overcoming failure and frustration while growing from those challenges. He shared a quote from Reinhold Niebuhr that encapsulated his strategy to obtain focus during

those difficult times. "God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, courage to change the things I can, and wisdom to know the difference."

Weilin added, "Things that are within our control are our ideas, our goals, and our actions. Things we cannot control are things like the weather, the past, or when COVID will stop."

Kiski Boys to maintain their status as life-long learners, to focus on metacognition or, more plainly, thinking about thinking. To evolve through self-reflection, Mrs. Poston guided the listeners to the five precepts found within *Insight: A Study of Human Understanding*, by philosopher Bernard Lonergan: be attentive, be intelligent, be reasonable, be responsible and be in love. In closing, she challenged both the adults and students listening to grow by continually assessing their mental approach to thinking, to make time to consider not just what you are learning, but how you are learning it.

Head of School, Mr. Chris Brueningsen, brought the last all-school assembly for the year to a close by thanking parents, students, faculty, and staff for their contributions toward overcoming the challenges brought on by the global health crisis. After all, overcoming the difficulties related to the pandemic was a full community effort. He summarized, "The experiences we've shared have undoubtedly brought us closer and there is good reason to be hopeful and optimistic that in the fall—whether you're going to college or returning to Kiski—life will much more closely resemble the normal that we were living before the pandemic.

SENIOR AWARDS CEREMONY

On the eve of Kiski's 133rd Commencement, seniors, their families, and the Kiski community were gathered safely under the expansive tent covering the Yukevich Quad for Kiski's first in-person event since March of 2020. The atmosphere was both exciting and extraordinary for many that were also attending their first large gathering in 15 months. Associate Head of School, **Mr. Adam Schapiro**, opened by flatly addressing the seniors with his endearing sarcasm, "Wow...some of you look good."

Chris Peirce '21 introduced his father and parent speaker, Mr. Robert Peirce III, who insightfully contested two widely discussed topics likely addressed by most graduation speakers. First, he challenged the concept that we are more divided than ever before with references to more tumultuous times in history.

In referencing historic problems that persist even today Mr. Peirce reminded the seniors, "Your generation, gentlemen, has the ability of knowledge of our past mistakes, and with knowledge comes power, and if you use that power in the right direction, you will be able to bring us together to help us to make the world a better place."

Mr. Peirce reminded the boys that change will require leadership and action, refuting the common graduation pronouncement that 'tomorrow's leaders are sitting before me." You don't see

a leader sitting here," argued Mr. Peirce. "A leader rises up when there is a difficult situation. You have to see a leader in action. A leader is someone who can see how things can be improved and who rallies people to move towards a better vision."

Associate Head of School, Mr. Mark Novom, shared two quotes with the boys so that they could consider the harmony of their seemingly diverging lessons. First, from his hero Jackie Robinson who said, "A life is not important, except in the impact it has on other lives." Next, he echoed Steve Jobs' reminder that, "Your time is limited so don't waste it living someone else's life." Mr. Novom inspired the boys to live their own lives while not forgetting the selfless enriching impact they can have on the lives of others. "You have to fight the urge of only thinking about yourself," he implored.

Once the superlative members of the Class of 2021 collected their awards, **Mr. Darryl Wiley**, CEO for the Fund for Advancement of Minorities through Education, honored **Eric Gary '21** for his selfless enrichment of the Kiski community and beyond with his touching personal praise.

Head of School, **Mr. Chris Brueningsen**, announced the final senior awards before sharing his reflections with the Class of 2021 and the unexpected turn in our shared journey over the previous

15 months. He commended the community for its ability to be flexible and adapt during the crisis.

He then told a remarkable true story about a group of Tongan boys that survived a shipwreck on a deserted island for over a year (retold in greater detail on pages four and five), likening that victory over adversity to the situation the Class of 2021 faced over their final five quarters of school.

As the ceremony came to a close, Mr. Schapiro playfully quizzed the boys to see if they could recall their instructions for the graduation ceremony the next morning, their final obligations as students. The Class of 2021 passed that last examination and the crowd was dismissed to take photos with friends and family, and enjoy desserts served from the Swank Student Center.

As the group slowly receded from the quad, the excitement lingered. The boys would spend one last night on campus together as a full class and officially join the alumni ranks the next day.

KISKI'S 133RD COMMENCEMENT CEREMONY

For the first time in two years, the sound of bagpipes followed the bell tolling from the Paradise Hall Bell Tower. Sounds that traditionally mark the start of a Kiski Commencement ceremony also marked the close of a miraculous year. Sacrifices were made and frustrations endured, but the Kiski community banded together to overcome the hurdles placed before them. In-person graduation was a fitting conclusion for meticulous safety planning, patient but strict adherence to sometimes stifling policies, and supportive words and funding from near and far. It was a triumph for the full Kiski family to share.

Head of School Mr. Chris
Brueningsen turned the focus to the seniors in saying, "Today we are here to celebrate and congratulate all of our seniors not just for completing our graduation requirements but for the work they put in and all that they have given our school during their time here." He then introduced Chair of the Board

of Trustees, **Mr. John Jacob '89**, who presented retiring Business Manager, **Mr. J. Gregory Forsythe**, with an honorary diploma and the title of Business Manager Emeritus for his 17 years of diligent service to Kiski.

Class Speaker and Head Prefect, Caleb Leechalk, summarized the mood of the event best by saying, "I'm so glad that we could all be here together instead of staring at one another through our computer screens." Caleb thanked the staff and faculty for keeping the Kiski Boys safe throughout the year and especially mentioned Director of Health Services, Ms. Taresa Cunnard, her staff, and the COVID task force affectionately known as the "CO-PO" (short for Covid-Police). He reflected positively on his schoolmates' abilities to make the best of the cards that they were dealt. Limited interaction brought greater value to the times when boys were able to gather. "It's about the journey and who you have with you on that journey," he said. "It's not a goodbye. It's a see you later."

The graduates received their diplomas, then Mr. Brueningsen introduced valedictorian Giovanni Cicala. "Even though all of us in the graduating class will move on from Kiski in the next few hours, I'm sure our minds will not," Gio reflected. "We spent way too much time with each other that we will not easily forget our Kiski experience." He pointed to the alumni community for evidence of his theory. "I've noticed that every time alumni come to campus to speak, their orations are filled with humorous or meaningful stories that occurred at Kiski. Whether they graduated in 1965 or 2005, they all still have fond memories of their high school years."

We wish nothing less for the Class of 2021, and look forward to their frequent returns. Mr. Brueningsen closed with, "For a short time goodbye, forever good luck and God bless all of you."

KISKI'S 132ND COMMENCEMENT CEREMONY

For the first time in Kiski's storied history, the school celebrated two commencement ceremonies in a single year. The day after the Class of 2021 left campus as graduates, the Class of 2020 was welcomed back to experience the in-person celebration they missed during the remote conclusion of their senior year. Of course, there were many in the class that were unable to attend due to travel restrictions. However, nearly half of the class united with family and friends for the joyous event.

Not knowing for certain who would attend, each arriving boy was greeted with cheers and hugs. As the start of the ceremony approached, the greetings seemed to crescendo. The class photo was taken and retaken as each late arrival joined his brothers on the steps of Old Main. Then, smiles went wide. Their graduation had finally arrived and their procession was prefaced by bagpipers and the tolling bell in the Paradise Hall Bell Tower. The light rain couldn't dampen their mood.

Their life-changing Kiski experience had already survived a pandemic.

"Our online graduation program last year concluded with me saying 'we look forward to welcoming you back to Kiski next May when we will celebrate your graduation in person.' And now we're making good on that promise," Head of School Mr. Chris Brueningsen declared in his opening remarks.

Chair of the Board of Trustees, Mr. John Jacob '89, praised the tenacious class in stating, "Class of 2020, now one year removed from your graduation, perhaps, my fellow alums, you have an even greater appreciation for the foundation you built from your time here at Kiski." He also noted that they have continued to rise above circumstances caused by the pandemic saying, "I know every one of you faced an incredibly difficult freshman year with perseverance. Well done, Class of 2020."

Head Prefect of the Class of 2020, **Mr. Patrick Jacob**, addressed his class

after a brief comedic pause to dry off the hand sanitizer from the dispenser located at the entrance to the dais. He began by recounting March 2020, when he learned that the boys would be dismissed for spring break, unlikely to return to campus. "It felt surreal," he remembered. "All of this was a blur to me. I was not able to comprehend what was actually happening." He continued, "This class will always be known as the 'COVID Class,' but I honestly believe it made our class bond more than any other Kiski class has before."

He also spoke from his unique perspective as a graduation student speaker who had completed his freshman year of college. Mr. Jacob recounted a writing class project in which his reflections on his school experience stood out favorably compared to those of his college classmates. "At Kiski, you learn how to interact with teachers in a similar manner to college students. You have to send them emails, go to office hours and make

a name for yourself in the classroom. At Kiski, you have to learn how to live away from your family and be on your own for the first time. At Kiski, you learn social skills and how to behave like a gentleman. Looking back on my time at Kiski, this is a place that truly shaped the type of person I am and it is a place I am extremely proud to call home."

Mr. J.P. Suozzi, the Class of 2020's valedictorian, spoke about the strength of the connection between the members of his unique class. "What is it that brings us back here? It really is the same thing that brings alumni back year, after year, after year. And that is the Kiski brotherhood," he said. "Each and every one of you guys is a brother to me. We will always be forever bound by our time and experiences at Kiski." He closed, pleading, "to my Class of 2020, make sure that we stay in touch."

The boys made their long awaited walks to the podium to receive their

diplomas and were then addressed via recorded remarks by alumni from different eras of the Kiski Brotherhood.

Mr. Logan Powell '92, congratulated the boys on their triumphant completion of both their Kiski education and their freshmen years at college. "I cannot even begin to imagine the stresses you have experienced over the past year and a half. And yet, here you are, new graduates of the best all-boys school in the world," Mr. Powell empathized. "You stood tall in the face of challenge and you emerged stronger young men because of it."

Mr. Ben Crewe'19, commended the Class of 2020 for their ability to adapt. "I've only been out of Kiski for two years now, but perhaps the largest gratitude I owe to this school is that it forced me to adapt."

The recorded alumni remarks were brought to a close by **Mr. Russell Swank '67** who congratulated the Class of 2020 for completing their journey and encouraged

them to reflect on all of the positive lessons they learned through adversity up to and including the pandemic. Mr. Swank listed traits that were honed during their Kiski years and closed by asking the boys to return frequently saying, "Make it a short goodbye. Come back and see us."

Mr. Brueningsen closed the ceremony by saying, "You've navigated through a very tough year and you've done it successfully and well. Through it all, you made use of the habits of self-reliance you practiced here, and most of all you have leaned on each other and the reliable friendships you have formed. Even though there have been periods of loneliness and isolation, in the end, the pandemic has brought us closer and the resulting message is an important one. In times of trouble, you can always turn to your Kiski family for help and support." •

ATHLETICS DURING A PANDEMIC

Athletic participation has always been a core element of the Kiski experience. Alumni fondly recall hard-fought victories, their teammates, legendary coaches, and even the grueling practices they survived. Preserving those opportunities for the grander life lessons learned and reinforced by athletics was one of the primary objectives for the 2020-21 school year.

Guidelines evolved as healthcare professionals learned more about preventing the transmission of COVID-19,

but the overall theme of "abundance of caution" prevailed in every planning discussion. With that directive in mind, Kiski competed against teams that shared stringent mitigation policies. Director of Athletics **Mr. Chris Spahn** noted the biggest challenge was, "Playing opponents that were following the same testing procedures as Kiski."

If all participants tested negative for COVID-19 before a contest, the game proceeded. Luckily, very few competitions were canceled due to positive tests.

"The lacrosse team only sustained one cancelation, and we were able to schedule another game to make up for it," said Spahn, who is also the Lacrosse Head Coach.

With fewer opponents, coaches created more competitive scenarios in training. "We were able to go out on Kiski's nine-hole course and create certain challenges. Whether it was playing from hole seven to the ninth green as a par-5, or having closest to the pin competitions, we were able to have a good time," reflected senior golfer **Zander Szilagyi**.

A yearning for competition led to the most unique game of the year. "Towards the end of the spring the [soccer] boys challenged the baseball team to a scrimmage and although we lost the game, I loved to see the boys competing again," recalled Soccer Head Coach Mr. Jonty Loukes.

Teams also relied more on intersquad contests when opponent options were limited. "Coaches were great though and pivoted quickly to holding intersquad scrimmages with uniforms and refs and filming everything just like a game," said Assistant Director of Athletics Mrs. Mary Grace Muster.

"The biggest challenge last season was getting exposure. Having won the state championship, the year before, we

had put ourselves in the eyes of many college coaches. However, with the limited amount of games and NCAA visit restrictions it was really hard to stand out," added senior soccer player Jose Muñoz. Games were live streamed over the internet for families who could not attend, and recordings were relied upon so that the student-athletes could display their abilities for college recruiters who were unable to observe in-person.

Other sacrifices were made to ensure safety. Travel time and associated costs increased to reach opponents. "Sometimes we would spend eight-plus hours in a van just to play one match since we couldn't stay overnight. Perseverance and adaptability were definitely skills that were honed in this experience," said Golf Head Coach Mr. Ryan John.

Additional safety measures were adopted by the Athletic Department

staff to prevent season-interrupting outbreaks. "[Distancing protocols] made it challenging to find areas that entire teams could meet for film or weight training," mentioned Field House Manager Mr. Lance Holupka.

However, these hardships were all an improvement over the spring 2020 athletic seasons that were entirely lost to the pandemic. The boys reacted phenomenally. "My guys didn't blink an eye. They were just happy to practice every day. It was the most fun I have had as a tennis coach in many, many years. I had to force them to end practice and go to dinner," shared Tennis Head Coach **Mr. Adam Schapiro**.

"Our kids knew if they stayed healthy, we would be able to play games. Knowing the little annoyances were a must; the kids did it," summarized Spahn.

Thanks to that mindset, the Athletic Department support staff and all of the

coaches were able to create safe athletic seasons and allow all of the new memories that will be shared for years. "We should appreciate everything we have day-to-day and make the most of the time we have on the field with our teammates," reflected Head Prefect Caleb Leechalk.

"My favorite story from this season was our golf match against WRA in Ohio. Despite the heavy rain and almost unbearable golf conditions, the boys were able to finish the match and come away with the win," said Szilagyi.

"We were very lucky to continue to practice and play intersquad scrimmages, something that the grand majority of prep schools could not do," concluded Muñoz. "Life is full of obstacles, but you are the one who can choose to face them with a smile on your face."



Mrs. Mary Grace Muster participated in the Invisible Playbook: How to Create a Culture of Inclusive Excellence workshop offered jointly by the New Jersey Association of Independent Schools and Pennsylvania Association of Independent Schools. The interactive discussion concerning inclusion in athletics was hosted over Zoom.

Likewise, the annual Pennsylvania School Librarian Association Conference was hosted online. **Mrs. Leslie Poston** attended the online workshops, author presentations, and keynotes remarks provided for school librarians across the commonwealth.



Each year Kiski selects an all-school book to build discussions around throughout the year. *Undocumented*, by Dan-el Padilla Peralta, covers the author's journey from the Dominican Republic as a young boy to finishing at the top of his Princeton class. Dan-el overcomes tremendous obstacles while attracting assistance from mentors that recognize his superior intellect and drive.

Mrs. Patricia Argyros attended classes on monotype printing, drawing, and glass mosaics. She will pass these new skills along in her freshmen art class as well as her drawing and painting classes. She also entered two mosaic pieces in the three-dimensional show at the Greensburg Art Center in September.

Mr. Brad Kwiatek attended an online course focused on the effects and methods of online teaching. The five-week program included synchronous and asynchronous learning experiences. He also attended the TABS Conference and the National Council of Teachers of English Conference. In addition, he worked closely with our speech and debate district committee and the national office to create opportunities for students to participate in online practices and events.

The school year ended with a voluntary three-day professional development experience led by Mr. Brendan Moriarty '86 meant to help teachers explore the important ideas in their own classes and how they mesh with the larger ideas important to Kiski culture. Attendance was excellent with an average of 15 teachers at each session. •



How Kiski Successfully Offered In-Person Instruction for the Entire 2020-2021 Academic Year

WHEN THE PARADISE BELL TOWER RANG OUT ONCE FOR EACH 2021 GRADUATE TO SIGNAL THE START OF KISKI'S 133RD COMMENCEMENT CEREMONY, it was also indicating that Kiski had jubilantly reached another finish line. "Having an in-person commencement for [the Classes of] 2020 and 2021 was the perfect reward for a job well done," shared Ms. Taresa Cunnard, Kiski's Director of Health Services and a member of Kiski's COVID-19 Task Force. Under the steady leadership of Head of School Mr. Chris Brueningsen, the School had safely offered in-person instruction for the entire academic year!

The Task Force started sixteen months earlier in March of 2020, just before the Kiski Boys would leave campus for spring break. "At first, we announced that we would delay the boys return by a week or two, and it became clear later that we would have to finish the fourth quarter of our year remotely instead," recounted Task Force member and Associate Head of School Mr. Mark Novom.

As the faculty and staff nimbly prepared for a full-remote finish to the 2020 school year, the Task Force looked ahead to plan for the 2020-21 academic year. Although intense uncertainty concerning the trajectory of the global health crisis remained, they planned optimistically for a return to in-person instruction.

By April, key segments for a plan to open the 133rd academic year under circumstances that would resemble as close to normal as possible began to form. The hybrid instruction platform, ONE Kiski, was developed to welcome students that were able to return to campus along with students that would either have to stay remote because of travel limitations or safety concerns.

Meanwhile, the Task Force pursued a Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments (CLIA) waiver to allow Kiski to become an approved COVID-19 rapid testing site. With the

waiver secured, Kiski was able to perform rapid tests to limit the exposure to and spread of COVID-19. Community members were tested periodically and before reentrance into what was termed "the Kiski Bubble," the campus community that was nearly entirely isolated from outside exposure.

By the end of the year, over 3,200 rapid COVID-19 tests were performed by Ms. Cunnard and her stalwart Health Center colleagues Mrs. Anita Bafik, RN and Ms. Jamie Kurek, RN. Individuals who tested positive, and their close contacts, were isolated to halt potential outbreaks. Polymerase chain reaction (more commonly known as PCR) tests were used to identify false-positive rapid tests or confirm them, reducing unnecessary isolation periods and related interruptions. Fortunately, Kiski obtained its CLIA waiver before a flood of waiver requests prevented peer schools from obtaining the same ability.

However, the plan to reopen was nearly derailed. Just before the school year started the scarce rapid tests Kiski purchased were confiscated by the Department of Homeland Security and diverted to areas of higher need determined by the agency. With students inbound, the Task Force pivoted to develop a strategy using PCR tests. The slower results produced by PCR tests required a one to three-day period of isolation and staggered arrivals, but the Kiski Boys and their parents cooperated graciously.

"Parents were very appreciative and supportive. Everyone wanted to get back to some kind of normal life again after being quarantined at home for so long," reflected Ms. Cunnard. Regarding the students, she added, "They knew that the testing protocols were what got them back in the classroom and back on the athletic field."

A survey of parents showed that respondents were 97% "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with Kiski's COVID-19 Health

and Safety Protocols. Task Force member and Associate Head of School **Mr. Adam Schapiro**, credited Kiski's adherence to a guiding principle for the approval. "We made good practical decisions with an abundance of caution and communicated them clearly and often," he said.

Ms. Cunnard added to that with a question that aided her with every decision: "If this was my child, what would I want and expect?"

Campus policies were informed by leading health professionals like the Centers for Disease Control, Pennsylvania's Department of Health, the National Association of School Nurses, and the Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh. Kiski's COVD-19 protocols included temporary, but necessary adjustments to typical operations in order to prevent an outbreak that would trigger a regression to full-remote instruction. The boys lived in dorms separated by athletic team, instead of by graduating class, to limit most interactions between sub-communities. An extensive meal distribution plan made it possible to safely feed the typically ravenous boys with only minimal handling of food and sharply reduced close interactions in the dining hall.

Along with the food service staff, the maintenance and cleaning professionals adopted new procedures to enhance their meticulous care for our campus and the community it supports. Director of Communications **Dr. Craig Olear** created Plexiglas barriers and signage throughout campus to direct the flow of foot traffic in a way that would minimize interaction. Alumni, parents, and friends of Kiski increased their support of The Kiski Fund and specific scholarship initiatives to aid with unforeseen expenses brought on by the pandemic. Traversing the school year without major pandemic-related incident was truly a full community effort that required discipline, patience, innovation, flexibility and resilience.

The careful planning of the Task Force continues to pay off for the current school year. Residents of the Kiski campus are now over 90% fully vaccinated, which allowed for an opening of the 2021-22 academic year that much more closely resembled normal.

Best of all, the boys are all back on campus. And after opening the last school year with 172 students, we reached our opening enrollment goal of 190 boys for the current year. Many parents of new enrollees credited our success with the 2020-21 school year as the motivation

behind their applications. "It's remarkable that our Admissions Office was able to reach our enrollment goal during the pandemic," said Mr. Schapiro. "They found innovative ways to speak with prospective families establishing virtual tours and online *Asked and Answered* sessions that gathered prospective families with faculty and boys that could address their thoughtful questions."

Our optimism continues to grow as we reintroduce Kiski traditions like all-school assemblies, full athletic schedules, and the unrestricted resumption of outdoor activities like leadership training on the Cas Devey '11 Memorial Ropes Course. Kiski will continue to persevere with a heightened appreciation for all that was threatened but sustained during the pandemic. We are grateful for your help with making the historic 2020-21 year a success despite the obstacles we faced as a community. Thank you! •






ROCKWELL GRAY (1938 - 2021)

Rockwell Gray's Wife and Former Kiski Teacher



ROCKWELL GRAY SPENT TEN YEARS at The Kiski School as Chair of the English Department. He arrived in 1980 after completing a yearlong grant given to him by the Center for Twentieth Century Studies at the University of Wisconsin. He left Kiski in 1990, wanting to return to teaching at the college level. He was highly-regarded as a professor of philosophy, social thought, and literature in both the United States and abroad.

He wrote the seminal intellectual biography of Ortega Y Gasset "The Imperative of Modernity," "A Century of Enterprise: St. Louis, 1894–1994," "Opening to the World: John Burroughs School at Seventy-five (1923–1998)," and he translated a collection of Chilean folk tales by Yolando Pino-Saavedra. He also published articles and essays in journals



all over the world. His passions for personal history, family, nature, and literature were key to his character.

At Kiski, Dr. Gray taught only in the mornings, having arranged with Headmaster **Jack Pidgeon** to keep afternoons free to do his own writing. With that agreement in place, he was able to publish essays in many intellectual journals. Feeling that Kiski Boys needed more of a cultural side to their education, he instituted off-campus trips for the first time to Pittsburgh Symphony concerts, theater events, and museum visits. He accompanied the students on all of these trips.

He also felt that the boys needed a place to share their written work, completed on their own, outside of the classroom. To that end, he established the Literary Forum that met bi-weekly. Students would share their writings with their peers in Dr. Gray's living room, sitting on the sofa, chairs, and floor. Comments were offered and Dr. Gray modeled how criticism could be given with respect, civility, and thoughtfulness. The boys loved to attend, and **Madelyn Gray**, his wife and fellow member of the English Department, often provided little snacks to accompany their creative endeavors.

One of his favorite assignments was library duty in the evenings each week. On the shelves he looked for books that neither students or faculty had checked out in many years, or at all. He perused those books with care, attempting to give them a chance to "live." For Rockwell Gray, books contained the voices of others, reaching out to educate, entertain and share experiences. It is interesting to note, that by the time of his passing, he had a collection of approximately 6,000 books in his home, filling thirty feet of his finished basement with shelves from ceiling to floor.


Dr. Gray's students will remember him for his remarkable capacity to listen deeply to comments from even the youngest and most inexperienced students. They most commonly noted his erudition and civility. He also encouraged, and often demanded, engagement in the classroom. An intellectual adventurer, he would regale the boys with stories of his


life in Chile and Mexico, as well as New England, where he was born and raised.

Unlike most others on campus, Dr. Gray was not particularly interested in competitive sports. The only athletic events that he truly enjoyed were those in which his sons, **Zachary Boyers '90** and **Lowell Boyers '84** participated. However, he did enjoy taking long bike

rides along the mountainous roads of Western Pennsylvania, surrounding Kiski and Saltsburg specifically. Very much a lover of nature, he was appreciative of the beauty of the campus and grateful to know his own boys and his daughter, **Elizabeth Gray**, could feel free and safe as they wandered across its 350 acres. •



GLENN BALLARD '51

Before Glenn Ballard, Class of 1951, became a legendary head of school at Brownwell-Talbot, Hockaday, Kinkaid, and Holland Hall, he was a versatile athlete and astute student at Kiski. He excelled on Kiski's football, swimming and diving, and baseball teams. Mr. Ballard attended Brown University on a football scholarship before an injury brought him home, where he finished his undergraduate degree at the University of Pittsburgh. Mr. Ballard earned his master's degree in math and philosophy at the University of Denver. He returned to serve on the Kiski faculty in an effort to give back some of what the school had given to him in both athletics and academics. He was a great coach and was known as a demanding but fair math teacher who put learning first.



PETER MARTORELLI '71

Peter Martorelli, Class of 1971, was one of the most dominant athletes of his era. He earned 11 varsity letters in football, basketball and baseball. He captained each team his senior year. Mr. Martorelli played center and linebacker on the football team and led the basketball team to Kiski's first Interstate Prep School League Championship. Rated as one of the best high school catchers in Pennsylvania, he accepted a scholarship to the University of Pittsburgh where he started all four years, captaining the Panthers his junior and senior years. He won Pitt's prestigious Blue-Gold Award in 1974-75, given annually to the best student-athlete.

The Hall of Fame honors those alumni, teams and coaches who have made outstanding contributions to Kiski athletics. The nominees exemplify the core values they learned at Kiski: principles of integrity, humility, sportsmanship and service.



JIM GARLAND '83

Jim Garland, Class of 1983, still held four top-ten all-time track and field performances for Kiski at the time of his induction. He was listed among the greats in the 800, 1,600, and 3,200 events, and his 4 by 800 relay team held the top time. He earned all-league honors for cross country, and turned in the sixth fastest time ever recorded on the Kiski course. The senior track and field captain won the 1,600 and 800 at the league championship meet. He continued his athletic career at Wittenberg University where he was a four-year letterman in cross country and track, and was captain of both teams. Following college, Mr. Garland embarked on a successful triathlon career.



1969 GOLF TEAM

The preview for the 1969 golf season predicted that Kiski had the "determination, talent and experience necessary for a winning season." However, all the Cougars did was win as they completed a 12-0 slate. Along with the aforementioned traits, the team benefited from incredible depth. The steady play necessary to win can be elusive during any given round, but the Kiski golfers managed to maintain consistency for a full season. Multiple teammates garnered top medalist honors. Players from this storybook team went on to compete in college, and later on the state and national levels.



Kiski clinched its first-ever Independent School Swimming League title after winning the last event of the championship meet held at Kiski. In doing so, that 400-yard freestyle relay team set school, pool and league records of 3:20.48. That title-clinching climax was earned one grueling training yard at a time. The team swam over 200,000 yards in practice with ten practices each week that included 6 a.m. sessions. Their determination drew them back from winter break five days early for a pre-season grind that included 14 practices. It was the commitment necessary to accomplish greatness and a legendary season. •

Gavin Benjamin was named the 13th annual Will's Gift Award recipient by Mr. Conrad during the 2021 Virtual Honors Convocation Ceremony. "My work is a combination of photography and mixed media. It's a combination of layers and patterns and textures dealing with politics, and pop-culture," stated Mr. Benjamin upon receiving the award. Mr. Benjamin earned his Bachelor of Fine Arts from the School of Visual Arts in New York City.
